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*London...* As one of the world's top destinations,

London is a bevy of English bobbies, an ocean of black umbrellas, and an unconquered continuance of more than 2,000 years of history. Now an uber-cool city, London remains history-steeped. There's sufficient antiquity and historic splendor around every corner... London's buildings are eye-catching milestones in the city's unique and compelling biography. There's more than enough funky innovation to put a crackle in the air, but it never drowns out London's well-preserved, centuries-old narrative. Architectural grandeur rises up all around you, ancient remains dot the city and charming pubs punctuate the Thames riverside. A tireless innovator of art and culture, London is a city of ideas, imagination, art and history all rolled into one. It's all here!



The Crown Jewels, Buckingham Palace, Camden Market... In London, history collides with art, fashion, food, and good British ale. Londoners are fiercely independent thinkers so the creative milieu is naturally streaked with attitude, from theatrical innovation to contemporary art, pioneering music, writing and design. A perfect day is different for everyone: culture hounds hit the Tate Modern and the Royal Opera House. Clotheshorses will drool over Oxford Street shops. For foodies, cream tea at Harrod's or crispy fish from a proper chippy offers classic London flavor. Music and book buffs will freak over Abbey Road and the Sherlock Holmes Museum.

And while English may be the national tongue, over 300 languages shape London's linguistic soundscape. These languages also represent cultures that season the culinary aromas on London's streets, the clothing you glimpse and the music you hear. It can seem like the whole world has come to town. Museums have collections as diverse as they are magnificent, while flavors at markets range across the gourmet spectrum. London's diverse cultural dynamism makes it quite possibly the world's most international city, while being somehow intrinsically British.

### *Did you know?*

- ✓ Most people have an impression that Big Ben is the name of the world-famous clock, or perhaps the tower that houses it. The name actually refers to the 13-ton bell. The tower is known as St. Stephen's Tower.
- ✓ The city that is presently known as London has gone through a variety of names during its history. At the time of the Roman Invasion, it was called Londinium. In Saxon times, it became known as Lundenwic. And during the kingdom of Alfred the Great, the city was known as Lundenburg.
- ✓ Her Majesty the Queen is not allowed to go into the House of Commons because she is not a commoner.
- ✓ Rumor has it that Windsor Castle is haunted by a range of ghosts, including King Henry VIII, Queen Elizabeth I, Mad King George, and Charles I.
- ✓ About sixteen percent of the UK's restaurants are located in London, and there are more Michelin-rated restaurants in London than in any city except for Paris.



- ✓ London is highly diverse ethnically and culturally; around one in three Londoners is a foreign national. Over 300 languages are spoken in London, more than in any other city in the world.
- ✓ The Queen's official residence, Buckingham Palace, was built in 1702... on the site of a notorious brothel!
- ✓ Harrods, London's most famous shop, once used a cobra to guard a valuable pair of sandals. They were priced at £62,000 and were covered in diamonds and sapphires.
- ✓ In England, people drive on the left side of the road...except for one road: Savoy Court in London. Here, cars are legally required to drive on the right; originally created in 1902 so that fancy folk could get straight out of their carriages into the Savoy Theatre. The law was never changed.
- ✓ Cab drivers in London are special. To become a taxi driver, they must pass 'The Knowledge Test.' Taking two to four years to study, they must memorize 25,000 streets and 20,000 landmarks.
- ✓ The London Underground (known as the Tube) is the oldest and longest metro in the world, with over 270 stations and 400 km of tracks.

## Day 1

*Meals in flight, on own*

## Day 2

*Dinner*

Hello London! Arrive in London, England in the early morning hours. Clear customs and transfer to your hotel. In the afternoon, catch up on some rest and get acclimatized to your new time zone, or go out and explore! This evening we'll have our Welcome, Safety & Orientation Meeting followed by dinner. Get ready for a fabulous week!



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Please know that we are able to offer hotel classes to fit every budget. Accommodation options range from hostel-type accommodation (which are very good in the UK), through 4-star properties. Please let us know your preference. Below is an example of a moderate 3-star property.



**Sample Hotel – Bayswater Inn London** - This budget-friendly hotel is located on the edge of Notting Hill, one of London's trendiest districts. You'll be within easy walking distance of Hyde Park as well as Bayswater and Queensway stations, putting you a brisk Tube ride from the sights of central London. There are shops and places to eat nearby, and Bayswater Inn is convenient for Portobello Road Market and shopping at Knightsbridge.

**Welcome, Safety & Orientation Meeting** – This is our group meeting to set your team up for success. Your Ambassador will go over everything from safety to weather, your itinerary, plus a fire drill. Have questions, want to celebrate a birthday or want to add something to your itinerary? Today is a day for sightseeing! Are you ready? We'll take the London Hop-On/Off Sightseeing Tour complete with a cruise on the Thames! In the evening, we'll have a West End theatre experience!

**The Original Sightseeing Tour** - The Original Tour is the essential introduction to London. Experience the magical sights and sounds of London in comfort and safety aboard this hop-on / hop-off bus tour. From historic sites and attractions, to some of the most famous views in the world, this tour will take you where you want to go. With over 80 stops and 3 main sightseeing routes, this tour is the finest way to see London and her landmarks. Sit back, relax and take in the sights, sounds and iconic views of the city, both ancient and modern.



**Thames River Cruise** – In conjunction with your hop-on/hop-off sightseeing tour, your ticket will also include a Thames River Cruise. See London from a fresh perspective, and sail along the River Thames! Cruises depart



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from Westminster Pier (Big Ben) and the Tower (of London) Pier. The passes are valid within the same 24 hours as your bus ticket. Commentary is generally available in English, French, German, Japanese, Mandarin and Spanish.

After our fun-filled day of exploration, we'll have dinner locally and then it's off to the theatre!

## LONDON WEST END

**West End Theatre** – The show will be in conjunction with the workshop we attended on the previous day. Groups may choose from a variety of shows and workshops. Let us know your preferences!

### Day 5

*Breakfast & dinner included; lunch on own*

Another great London day!! After breakfast we'll start by visiting Shakespeare's Globe for a tour and a Master Class. In the afternoon we'll check out the Tate Modern Museum and then, when evening starts to set, a special walking tour!

**Shakespeare's Globe – Private Tour & Master Class** - Shakespeare's Globe is a faithful reconstruction of the open-air Elizabethan playhouse associated with William Shakespeare, designed in 1599 and a unique international resource dedicated to the exploration of Shakespeare's work and the playhouse for which he wrote. You and your students can unlock Shakespeare's themes, characters and stories inspired by the unique setting of the Globe as you see Shakespeare's life and works come alive. Includes a 1-hour Master Class led by a Globe Education Practitioner and based on any Shakespeare play of your choice, plus a half-hour guided visit to the theatre.




**The Tate Modern Museum** – The Tate Modern is an institution that houses the UK's national collection of British art, international modern and contemporary art. It is known as the home of British art from 1500 to the present day and is one of the largest museums of modern and contemporary art in the world. Tate Modern was opened by Queen Elizabeth on 11 May 2000. In its first year, Tate Modern received 5.25 million visitors.

To finish our day, we'll have a little fun and excitement!



**Jack the Ripper Walking Tour** – As twilight unfolds across the sinister thoroughfares of London's East End and as the shadows lengthen across its cobblestone courtyards and tucked away passageways, this tour sets off into the dark alleyways and darker recesses of Whitechapel to follow the ripper's blood-stained trail of terror. Step-by-bloodcurdling-step you will find yourself spirited back in time to the dark autumn nights of 1888 when Jack the Ripper prowled the very streets and people walked in fear!



Afterwards, we'll have dinner locally.

## Day 6

*Breakfast & dinner included; lunch on own*

Today is our last full day in London and it will be a great one with three incredible activities. We'll start at the world renowned British Museum, followed by the Tower of London and wrap up with a specialty Beatles Walking Tour!

**The British Museum** - The British Museum is a public institution dedicated to human history, art and culture. Its permanent collection numbers some 8 million works and is among the largest and most comprehensive in existence, having been widely sourced during the era of the British Empire and documenting the story of human culture from its beginnings to the present. A brilliant experience not to be missed!



**The Tower of London** – Officially Her Majesty's Royal Palace and Fortress of the Tower of London, the Tower of London is a historic castle located on the north bank of the River Thames in central London. Despite the Tower of London's grim reputation as a place of torture and death, within these walls you will also discover the history of a royal palace, an armoury and a powerful fortress. Don't miss Royal Beasts and learn about the wild and wondrous animals that have inhabited the Tower, making it the first London Zoo. Discover the priceless Crown Jewels, join an iconic Beefeater on a tour and hear their bloody tales, stand where famous heads have rolled, learn the legend of the Tower's ravens, storm the battlements and get to grips with swords and armour!



Hey Jude, how do you fancy a walk?

**Beatles Walking Tour** - This walk is a unique opportunity to imagine the Beatles and the swinging 60s in London. It is a Magical Mystery Tour of the Beatles' London haunts:

- Their Apple offices, where the group played the famous 'rooftop session'
- Paul McCartney's offices where Paul can be seen occasionally
- The well-known London theatre which became 'birthplace' of Beatlemania



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- The site of John's infamous 'bigger than Jesus' interview
- What John Lennon was doing outside some public toilets in 1966!
- The studio where Hey Jude was recorded
- The shopping street that was the heart of 'Swinging London'
- Abbey Road Studios and the famous Abbey Road crossing
- The tour ends at 'Helter Skelter' the Beatles Coffee Shop, where you can buy a range of Beatles souvenirs including The Guide to the Beatles London



Tonight, we'll have dinner locally before starting to pack up to hit the road in the morning.

## Day 7

*Breakfast & dinner included; lunch on own*

Get loaded up because today we're leaving London to see some other amazing English delights! Our first stop will be Bath, approximately a 2.5-hour drive. Once in Bath we'll check out the Jane Austen Centre and then get a guided historical tour to learn all about this lovely city and check-out the Roman Baths that inspired its name.



**The Jane Austen Centre** - Delve into the life of Britain's favorite author, Jane Austen. Exhibits and costumed characters tell the story of Austen's time spent living here in Bath between 1801 and 1806 and the impact it had on her work. Situated in an original Georgian townhouse, come and meet the costumed 'character' guides, and enjoy being shown Bath's fascinating history and its associations with Jane Austen and her family. The Centre also now features a specially commissioned waxwork of Jane – two years in the making, with the assistance of an internationally-renowned sculptor, an FBI-trained forensic artist and a Bafta and Emmy award-winning costume designer.

Groups will enjoy:

- Admission & tour of the facility



- Lady Catherine’s Proper Cream Tea - warm scones served with Dorset clotted cream, locally sourced jams and a hot drink
- 1.5-hour historical tour of Bath



Next up, we’re off to Stonehenge –

**Stonehenge** - Walk in the footsteps of your Neolithic ancestors at Stonehenge – one of the wonders of the world and the best-known prehistoric monument in Europe. Explore the ancient landscape on foot and step inside the Neolithic Houses to discover the tools and objects of everyday Neolithic life. Visit the world-class exhibition and visitor center with 250 ancient objects and come face to face with a 5,500-year old man.

For centuries, historians and archaeologists have puzzled over the many mysteries of Stonehenge, the prehistoric monument that took Neolithic builders an estimated 1,500 years to erect. Located in southern England, it is comprised of roughly 100 massive upright stones placed in a circular layout. While many modern scholars now agree that Stonehenge was once a burial ground, they have yet to determine what other purposes it served and how a civilization without modern technology—or even the wheel—produced the mighty monument. Its construction is all the more baffling because, while the sandstone slabs of its outer ring hail from local quarries, scientists have traced the bluestones that make up its inner ring all the way to the Preseli Hills in Wales, some 200 miles from where Stonehenge sits on Salisbury Plain. Today, nearly 1 million people visit Stonehenge, a UNESCO World Heritage Site since 1986, every year.



After, we’ll start on onward journey to Warwickshire in the West Midlands of England. The county is famous for being the birthplace of William Shakespeare and is home to stunning Warwick castle. This evening, we’ll stay here and have dinner locally.

## Day 8

*Breakfast included; lunch & dinner on own*

Rise and shine London! After breakfast this morning, we’re off bright and early to discover a true gem - Warwick Castle!



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**Warwick Castle** - Experience one thousand years of jaw-dropping history at Warwick Castle - great battles, ancient myths, spellbinding tales, pampered princesses, heroic knights. Warwick Castle is one of the most famous and daunting castles in the world; a medieval castle developed from an original built by William the Conqueror in 1068. Warwick is the county town of Warwickshire, situated on a bend of the River Avon. An audio guide is included for all participants.



Following our morning of ancient castle exploration, we're off through the countryside, driving up to Edinburgh, Scotland, stopping for lunch and dinner along the way. Lunch and dinner will be 'purchase on own' allowing us to stop whenever we are hungry and trying some different types of foods along the way. The drive is about 5 to 6-hours.

## Day 9

*Breakfast & dinner included; lunch on own*

Good morning Scotland! Get ready for a great day, checking out all this is Scotland!

**Scotland...** The history of Scotland is as fascinating as it is complex. There were tribal Celts and ancient, face-painted Picts, Roman conquerors and audacious red-headed Vikings, fallen monarchs and powerful warrior-royals, noble clansmen, great explorers, pensive philosophers, bright inventors, and all that came with them and the remnants they left behind including astonishing signs of their presence and sophistication. Think ancient and mysterious standing stones, fine castles and lavish stately homes, striking architecture, derelict fortresses, world-famous feats of engineering and more! From the Scottish Borders to Orkney and from Fife to the Isle of Skye, fierce battles, cruel ridings and bloody risings were won and lost, lasting unions were forged, and new discoveries and world-changing inventions were made.

What makes Scotland unique? Is it their love of whisky, kilts and ceilidhs? The monster at the bottom of their loch, or the prickly plant they use as their national symbol? For anyone spending time in Scotland, a toe-tapping tune, a jovial dance and a hearty sing-a-long is almost a guarantee, and it's rarely a quiet affair. Traditional Scottish music still reverberates around the country. You'll hear street pipers blast the pipes, energetic fiddle sessions and the gentle melodies of folk songs echoing from inside pubs. Welcome to Scotland!

**Local School Visit** - We'll start the day visiting a local Scotland school. Sample Schools may include both private and public schools. Examples: Mary Erskine's School or Stewart's Melville College.



Next, we're off to discover fabulous history.



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**Edinburgh Castle, The Royal Mile & Old Town Historical Walking Tour** – Scotland’s history stretches back thousands of years. From tribal Celts to noble clansmen, mysterious standing stones to lavish castles, you’ll find signs of our complex history all over the country. In this 3-hour walking tour, take a step back into Edinburgh’s fascinating past.

**Edinburgh Castle** - Edinburgh Castle is a historic fortress which dominates the skyline of the city of Edinburgh from its position on the Castle Rock. Archaeologists have established human occupation of the rock since at least the Iron Age (2nd century AD), although the nature of the early settlement is unclear. There has been a royal castle on the rock since at least the reign of David I in the 12th century, and the site continued to be a royal residence until 1633. From the 15th century the castle's residential role declined, and by the 17th century it was principally used as military barracks with a large garrison. Its importance as a part of Scotland's national heritage was recognized increasingly from the early 19th century onwards, and various restoration programs have been carried out over the past century and a half. As one of the most important strongholds in the Kingdom of Scotland, Edinburgh Castle was involved in many historical conflicts from the Wars of Scottish Independence in the 14th century to the Jacobite rising of 1745. Research undertaken in 2014 identified 26 sieges in its 1100-year-old history, giving it a claim to having been "the most besieged place in Great Britain and one of the most attacked in the world".



**The Royal Mile** is the name given to a succession of streets forming the main thoroughfare of the Old Town of the city of Edinburgh. The term was first used descriptively in 1901 and then as the title of a guidebook, published in 1920. The thoroughfare is, as the name suggests, approximately one mile long and runs downhill between two significant locations in the history of Scotland, namely Edinburgh Castle and Holyrood Palace.



Before we leave the area, we’ll do a little more digging into castle life!

**The Edinburgh Dungeons** – Are you ready to experience a different type of theatre? This awesome 80-minute tour take you through 1000 years of Scottish history via 2 underground rides and 11 live shows. The Edinburgh Dungeon brings together an amazing cast of theatrical actors, special effects, stages, scenes and rides in a truly



unique and exciting walk through experience that you see, hear, touch, smell and feel. It's hilarious fun and it's sometimes a bit scary!

- ✓ Full on 360 sets with gripping storytelling
- ✓ 11 interactive shows, 500 years of history
- ✓ State of art theming and special effects
- ✓ 2 thrilling underground rides
- ✓ Laughs, screams and cutting-edge storytelling



In the evening, we'll have dinner locally and then some free time for rest and relaxation.


### **Day 10**

*Breakfast & dinner included; lunch on own*

For our last day in Scotland, we'll discover life outside of the city center with visits to some of Scotland's most scenic and historic places!

**Day Excursion to Stirling Castle, Loch Lubnaig & Loch Katrine with a Private, Historical Guide** – Our private guide will walk us through the history, beauty and classic Scottish scenes, giving you all the details to make the day super special!

**Stirling Castle** - Located in Stirling, the Castle is one of the largest and most important castles in Scotland, both historically and architecturally. Stirling Castle was the key to the kingdom of Scotland, dominating a vast volcanic rock above the river Forth at the meeting point between Lowlands and Highlands. Its origins are ancient and over the centuries it grew into a great royal residence and a powerful stronghold.



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
There have been at least eight sieges of Stirling Castle, including several during the Wars of Scottish Independence (think Braveheart), with the last being in 1746, when Bonnie Prince Charlie unsuccessfully tried to take the castle. In times of peace Scottish royalty came to Stirling to enjoy its comforts, the superb hunting and to hold court – the castle was often the center of government. Royal building projects like the Great Hall, the Chapel Royal and the Palace of James V, marked it out as one of the most important places in all Scotland. Before the union with England, Stirling Castle was also one of the most used of the many Scottish royal residences, very much a palace as well as a fortress. Several Scottish Kings and Queens have been crowned at Stirling, including Mary, Queen of Scots in 1542, and others were born or died there. Later it became an important military base and eventually home to the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders.

**Loch Lubnaig** - Loch Lubnaig is a small but stunningly located stretch of freshwater nestling between two striking mountains, Ben Ledi and Benvane to the southwest and Ben Vorlich to the northeast. Loch Lubnaig is near Callander in the Stirling council area of the Scottish Highlands. It lies in Perthshire and is part of the Loch Lomond & Trossachs National Park. A bird's eye view of the loch reveals how it came by its name, for Lùbnaig means crooked in Gaelic.



**Loch Katrine** – Loch Katrine is steeped in history, natural beauty and is the gateway to the Great Trossachs Forest National Nature Reserve, in the Heart of the National Park. It is the perfect place for a day trip and cruise. The various adventures available include sailing on the world-famous Steamship Sir Walter Scott and cycling or walking back down the north shore of the Loch. The stunning and ever-changing scenery is breathtaking and is one of Scotland's most beautiful hidden gems.

Finally, hop aboard the steamship Sir Walter Scot and get ready to cruise the lake.



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**Steamship Sir Walter Scott** - This is the perfect crossing for groups looking to relax and soak up the scenery. The 1-hour cruise departs from Trossachs Pier taking you on an awe-inspiring journey. On the 60-minute sailing, you'll glide past stunning Trossachs landmarks such as Ben A'an and Ben Venue and the lake's restaurant's namesake location, Brenachoile, from the Gaelic for "above the trees". Enjoy the on-board heated saloon and settle in while listening to the tales and legends of the loch narrated by the knowledgeable crew.

For our last night in Scotland, we'll wrap up with a very special evening. We'll be invited to a local school for some fun, dinner and entertainment. Ready for the bagpipes?
